This year, many of our 48 graduates attained collegiate credits during their time in high school. Still other graduates attained trade certificates and have already captured apprenticeships and partnerships with various industries.

These graduates are already directly engaged in the workforce earning income and supporting the needs of our larger economy by filling the gap of historically low unemployment rates. These students exemplify the purpose of the RVA, providing a non-traditional pathway for students to excel, feel successful, and pursue their passions and dreams at a time, place, path, and pace which matches their ambitions and abilities.

As we conclude our 13th year of operation, it is with great honor that I present to you this year's Annual Performance Report.

This has been a year of firsts for our school. Most prominently, the culmination of over 13 years of work to build a complete grade PreK-12 school for families was realized. We celebrated the graduation of nearly 50 seniors, many of whom have been with us through the years forging new virtual learning pathways in education. Our graduates included young mothers, students who had earned collegiate credit through the State's Course Options program, as well as those with exceptional learning needs. Each of these graduates were granted a high school diploma and all are well on track to chase their passions into post-secondary education, the military, or careers.

All of our graduates were remarkable. One of our young mothers received her high school diploma while also attaining 45 college credits during her time in high school. We graduated first generation Americans that live in non-English speaking homes who now have a foothold to pursue the American dream holding their high school diploma. A student with exceptional needs earned an Academic Excellence Scholarship paying for up to \$10,000 in tuition for a State college. Other students graduated this year after previously being unsuccessful in traditional schools, having been credit deficient and on-track to be dropouts. These unique situations are not rare. Every one of our RVA graduates had a compelling story. Each were dispersed among their RVA classmates forming a collective class of students connected not by geography but by common circumstances and a drive to succeed regardless of barriers or challenges. All of our graduates found academic success in the RVA, new friendships, and pathways into the future where the doors of opportunity have been opened to them by their earning of a RVA high school diploma. These accomplishments have been realized because of the relentless and dedicated efforts of the RVA staff, the support of the community, RVA Governance Board, Medford Area Public School District Board of Education, and most certainly to all the parents and students.

The face of education continues to evolve and mature. No more clearly transparent is this evolution seen than by looking at our school. Market displacement happens when current products and services are replaced by those which are more easily attainable, reliable, and efficient. The RVA's development has been purposeful to be at the forefront of education finding niches of families and students not previously served well under the traditional systems of brick and mortar schools.

Although traditional school environments are open to all children, we know they do not equitably serve each child to their greatest potential. Aged infrastructures and bureaucracy hold traditional schools to set times of day that often only provide educational advancement opportunities to children 180 days a year. Budgetary constraints do not allow for schools to operate efficiently year-round or maintain personalized educational pathways for students due to the set curriculum choices and advance them largely based on age.

In today's society, we hold schools largely responsible for the safe care of our children during the day so that parents are both able to work. This daycare aspect of schools to provide a safe and nurturing environment is at the core of what all communities expect when they send their children off to school each day. With recent trends of school violence ever increasing in our nation, even this cornerstone of American public schools is showing signs of erosion.

As we prepare our next generation of children to face an economic world of industries not yet developed, along with the growing need to replace the current American workforce being depleted by retirements faster than ever before with highlyqualified and prepared employees, we must find new educational pathways to meet the economic and societal demands. The RVA has started to face this need through providing academic opportunities to students to chase their passions early. This year, many of our 48 graduates attained collegiate credits during their time in high school. Still other graduates attained trade certificates and have already captured apprenticeships and partnerships with various industries. These graduates are already directly engaged in the workforce earning income and supporting the needs of our larger economy by filling the gap of historically low unemployment rates. These students exemplify the purpose of the RVA providing a non-traditional pathway for students to excel, feel successful, and pursue their passions and dreams at a time, place, path, and pace which matches their ambitions and abilities.

Our exemplary graduating class points to why the RVA continues to grow and displace the traditional school setting. The RVA is a school that provides each child an individualized learning pathway, engages students in educational experiences with coursework students feel most successful in and enjoy, and provides these opportunities in a year-round setting from the comfort and safety of the student's home. And, when students need the resources found in a traditional school setting, the RVA also promotes and shares these experiences with shared classes and in the ongoing development of local "learning centers." We witnessed again this year that the launch of successful initiatives by the RVA comes at the cost of exceptional growth.

The start of this past school year brought with an increase of 50% full-time virtual school student enrollments over the previous school year. In comparison, when looking back over the past 10 years, the overall average growth for the RVA has been 36% a year. Additionally, the "blended learning initiative" grew this year to serve over 5,000 course enrollments supported by approximately 70 brick and mortar teachers bringing unprecedented opportunities to expand flexible offerings to our consortium school districts.

The start of this past school year brought with an increase of 50% full-time virtual school student enrollments over the previous school year. In comparison, when looking back over the past 10 years, the overall average growth for the RVA has been 36% a year. Additionally, the "blended learning initiative" grew this year to serve over 5,000 course enrollments supported by approximately 70 brick and mortar teachers bringing unprecedented opportunities to expand flexible offerings to our consortium school districts.

Along with our school operations growing, so did our consortium. The RVA finished the 2017-2018 school year partnering with 23 school districts up from 19 only a year ago. These partner school districts represent approximately 5% of the total school districts in the State of Wisconsin. By every measure, this is exceptional growth. This growth also marks the largest experienced by the school since it opened in 2005.

It serves as an indication of increasing interest from new families, new districts, as well as positive satisfaction from current families and districts resulting in high levels of retention. In looking forward, early review of key indicators suggest continued growth in all areas. As an example, during this past Spring "Open Enrollment" period, the RVA received the largest number of open enrollment applications over any other previous year. Likewise, initial interest in blended learning offerings and the use of digital content in the traditional classrooms remain strong and new district partnerships are in different phases of initiation as the RVA continues to expand its cooperative model of providing flexible digital learning options to all corners of the State.

Unquestionably, growth of this magnitude brings with it dynamic challenges. These challenges include the continual hiring and onboarding of new staff, space, and organizational logistics. The year's expansion led to the restructuring of teaching responsibilities, office expansions, and additional layers of management resulting in near continuous hiring, promotions, and reassignments throughout the school year. Along with the expansion of the school, the RVA has continued

to review metrics of quality to insist on being held in both high regard and accountability by the State, our districts, and most importantly to our families. The RVA engaged in multiple research projects this year requesting outside groups to analyze the operations of the school to suggest and find areas of strength and improvement. The RVA was present at the Wisconsin School Board Association's annual conference to help educate all interested districts in the opportunities RVA can provide. Both teaching and support staff were engaged in on-going professional development throughout the year to learn about emerging trends in technology, education, and customer-service. The large takeaways from all these reports and trainings was that education, like all other industries, is becoming more individualized and that those schools which are most successful are those who are able to embrace, achieve, and maintain a mission of customer-service built around strong relationships.

The RVA is built upon this principle. We know that it is the relationship between the home and the school that is the greatest determining factor of a child's ability to achieve all they are able to. Building strong relationships between the home and school is critical to making true reforms in public education. The bond between our RVA families and staff is truly unlike any other we see in today's traditional classrooms. It stands as a model of how keeping parents connected and directly invested in their child's

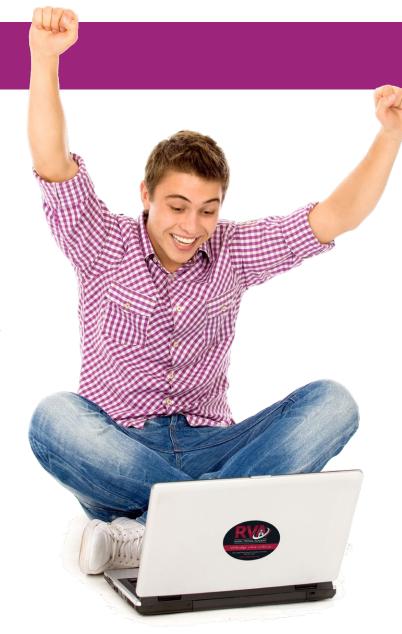
It is the mission of the RVA to provide student access to a challenging, high-quality, standards driven curriculum, in a flexible home environment.

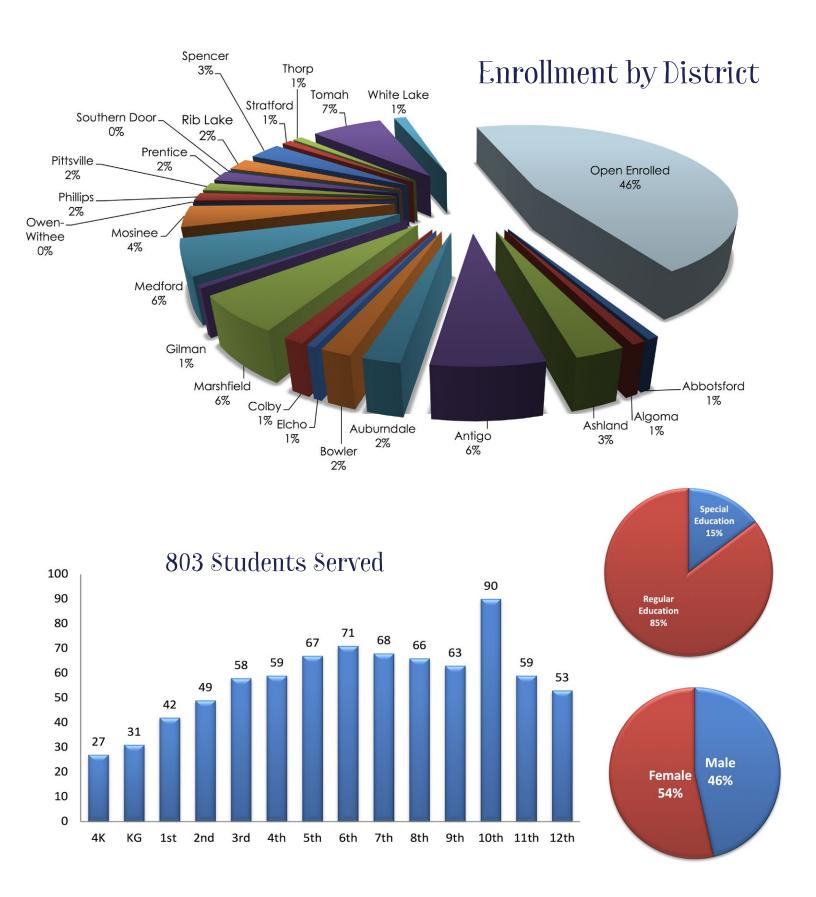

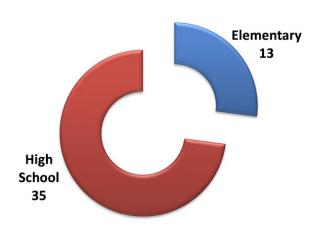


Entry / Withdrawal

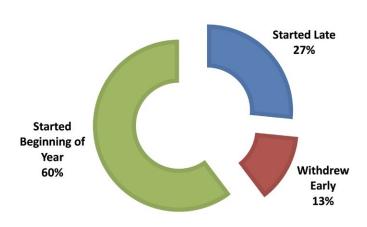
Every student who attends the RVA enters the school through parental choice. There are no student assignments to the RVA made by school districts. The RVA is a year-round school permitting students to enter the school at any time of the year, pending it is in their best interest and in allowable enrollment periods determined by the Department of Public Instruction. Students can also transfer out of the RVA at any point in the school year. At times, the flexibility and accountability of the RVA does not make a good

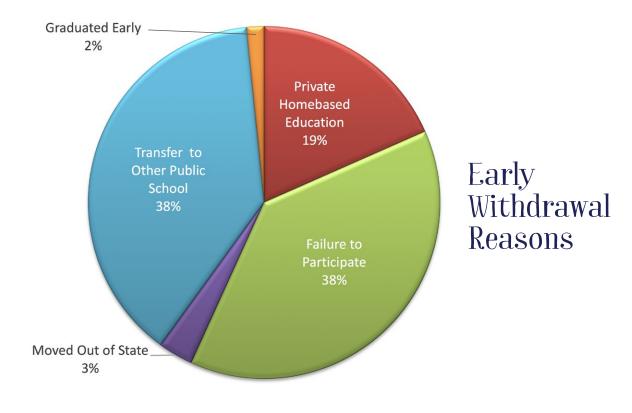
match for students. Wisconsin statute 118.40(8)(g) requires pubic virtual charter schools to remand students back to their resident districts if students demonstrate a "failure to participate" to an assignment or other teacher directive 3 times in a semester. This helps ensure that students who are provided the privilege to attend a virtual charter school, like the RVA, demonstrate the appropriate levels of responsibility necessary to make this form of education a successful opportunity.

Curriculum

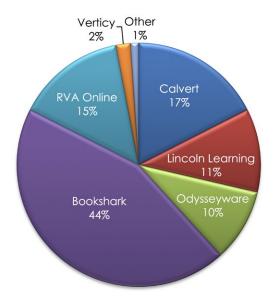
The RVA offers families wide-ranging options of curriculum choices from completely offline, to completely online, to options in between. All curriculum options are secular and piloted prior to being adopted to ensure they meet the rigor and learning standards which meet or exceed those found in traditional school settings. The RVA is not exclusively contracted with any particular vendor and is constantly looking for new and improved learning options for our students. All curriculum options match Wisconsin State Academic Standards and teachers are provided ongoing professional development to ensure they can support parents and students in the delivery of daily lessons to fidelity.

"RVA Online" is used to describe the digital content purchased through the Wisconsin eSchool Network. This network is comprised of school districts from around Wisconsin, in partnership with the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction,

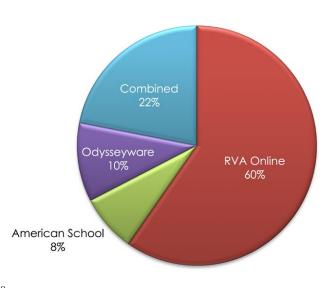
who collectively vet and procure digital content from a variety of vendors. The RVA is an Invested Member of the network and maintains a seat on the Board of Directors. The network acts as a cooperative and because of the volume purchases made, the RVA has access to the highest quality digital content found on the market at the lowest access prices. These cost savings are passed along to the RVA consortium and help keep overall per pupil costs as some of the lowest found in virtual education. Additionally, cost savings in curriculum allows the RVA to expense on human capital ensuring that families are well supported in all areas of their child's education.

The following charts show the percentage of curriculum choices selected by parents in both the elementary, [PreK - 8], and high school, [9-12] grades.

Academic Performance

Academic performance of students in school can be measured in various ways including formative assessments gathered by reviewing daily work, summative assessments gathered periodically to measure incremental learning over the course of the year in any particular subject, and in the use of standardized measures such as State exams, progress monitoring probes, and placement tests. The following gives a brief description of each of these types of academic measures used by the RVA over the course of the 2017–2018 school year.

Formative and Summative Subject Area Testing

Minimum subject area testing is required after the completion of a set number of daily lessons. Additional daily assessments may be required in the form of online writing, quizzes, and tests assigned by the RVA Teacher. The Home Mentor or other designated proctor must monitor the student while tests are being completed. Test results are returned to the student and scores recorded by the RVA Teacher.

Performance-Based Alternative Assessment

If a student chooses, and it is mutually agreed upon by the Home Mentor and the RVA Teacher, an alternative assessment may be allowed to replace the requirement of the subject unit exam(s). The alternative assessment may be used for a specific subject or for multiple subjects and the score would be equivalent to the exam it replaces.

In the 2017-2018 school year, students took part in a number of alternative assessments and projects including creating videos, inventions, and other presentations. All families were encouraged to pass on paper examinations whenever they wanted in place of demonstrating learning through project-based assessments. We will continue working with staff to further build options beyond the books for students to demonstrate learning in unique ways.

Standardized Testing

Students are required to take periodic standardized tests through providers determined by the RVA. These tests are used to determine proficiency and academic growth of the students participating in the Rural Virtual Academy. These tests provide near immediate feedback and in part serve to facilitate the accountability requirement of the charter.

During the 2017-2018 school year, the RVA required all new elementary students to take both the DORA (Diagnostic Online Reading Assessment) and ADAM (Adaptive Diagnostic Assessment of Mathematics). In addition, the RVA participated in assessing students in the State required examinations including the: Wisconsin Forward, ACT Aspire, ACT, and also used the DORA / ADAM tests to measure growth for students in grades PreK-2. The RVA will continue utilized AIMSweb® to assist in the progress monitoring of students using intervention curriculum to help determine if progress was being made.

Grade Advancement

RVA students receive grades on assignments similar to students enrolled in traditional schools. Some assignments are graded automatically within the course, some are graded by the RVA Teacher, and where relevant, the online teacher provides feedback in the form of a grade or report. Students receive comments on completed work and periodic grade updates. Final grades are determined by averaging all the work for the year. All grades appear on a formal transcript.

The initial responsibility for deciding whether there is retention

or advancement of a student rests with the teacher(s) primarily responsible for the child's education, the administrator overseeing the child's teacher, and the parent/ legal guardian of the child. These provisions include but are not limited to: academic achievement, intelligence, attendance, self-image, attitude, experiential background, and social/ emotional maturity.

Almost all students attending the RVA in 2017–2018, who were not removed for lack of academic participation, have either successfully completed their grade level course work or are completing course work over the summer for promotion to the next grade level.

Graduation

Most significantly this year, the RVA celebrated its first graduating class of 48 students. All of these students met or exceeded the full graduation requirements set forth by the State of Wisconsin statute 118.33, our authorizer, the Medford Area Public School District's, Board of Education's graduation policy, all corresponding consortium Board of Education policies, and all other expectations set-forth by the school.

State Testing

The State of Wisconsin requires testing of all public education students in grades PreK - 11. The tests take place in a specific time frame designated by the State of Wisconsin each year. In accordance with state law, it is required that state tests be administered by the RVA Teacher or other proctor assigned by the RVA Administrator. The RVA Teacher or assigned proctor must be present at all times while the tests are administered.

Some of the exams were given in the fall, while most where given in the spring, and others were given multiple times over the course of the year. Results from the exams at the time of this printing were still "embargoed" for public release. However, the

RVA did experience the largest number of families requesting "opt-outs" and refusals to take the required examinations this year than ever before. This lack of participation in the past was used to penalize schools even though local Board policy and State statute allowed for parental choice in opting-out. We look forward to new standardized report cards that will exclude these penalizing factors and give a better measure of how students whose parents value the tests actually perform.

Activities

During the 2017-2018 school year, 78 physical field trips and activities were provide to our RVA families by our Regional Event Coordinators. In addition to these field trips and activities, RVA teachers provided access to online clubs and events including "Snow Days,""LEGO Club," "RVA's Got Talent," "Writer's Block," "Cooking Club," "Sign Language," "Online Art," and "Story Club." High school students also took part in co-curricular opportunities including "RVA Weekly," "Student Council," and "Yearbook." In total, field trips, activities, and clubs equaled over 100 different activities for families and students to take part in over the school year.

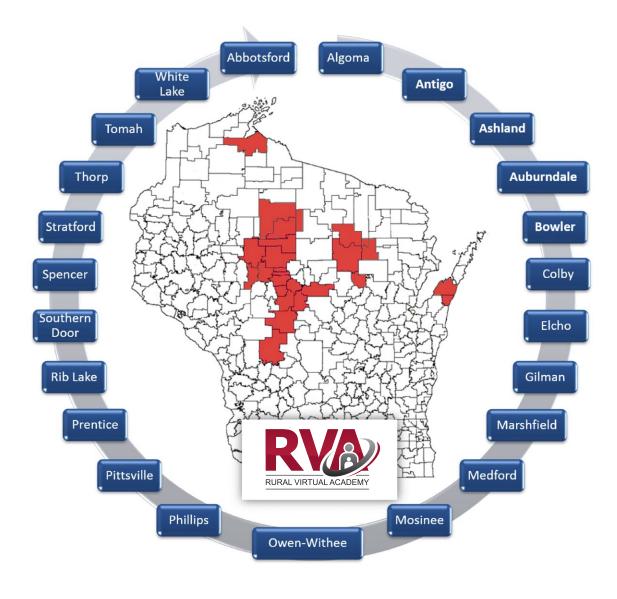
Partnerships

Consortium

The RVA's consortium continues to grow. Through the use of the State of Wisconsin statute 66.0301, the RVA uses these cooperative agreements to share in educational partnerships with districts all throughout Wisconsin. Districts have the option of joining as members under single year agreements or multi-year agreements. Single-year members are considered "affiliate" members and are provided a reduced per enrollment cost, in comparison to open enrollment as well as access to digital curriculum to be used in traditional classrooms. Multi-year members are considered "invested" members. The invested districts are committed to the operations of the RVA for the length of the charter, which is a maximum of five years. These districts are subject to a formulary where the end cost per pupil

is determined by the total revenue, less expenses, then divided by the total number of students attending. Additionally, these districts can hold a voting seat on the RVA Governance Board as well as access to digital content and professional development for teachers wishing to incorporate digital learning courses in their classrooms.

Over the past year, the consortium grew to 23 districts. Fifteen invested and eight affiliate members now comprise the make-up of the consortium, and ongoing efforts to bring on further members are underway.



Virtual & Blended

The RVA serves not only full-time virtual enrollments but also supports the growth of blended learning in the traditional classrooms throughout all the consortium district's schools. By providing both services, the RVA is able provide partner districts greater leverage to support the increasing benefits

digital learning brings to education. These benefits include cost savings over traditional textbooks, engaging content embedded with videos and interactive lessons, the most current information, and instantaneous feedback.

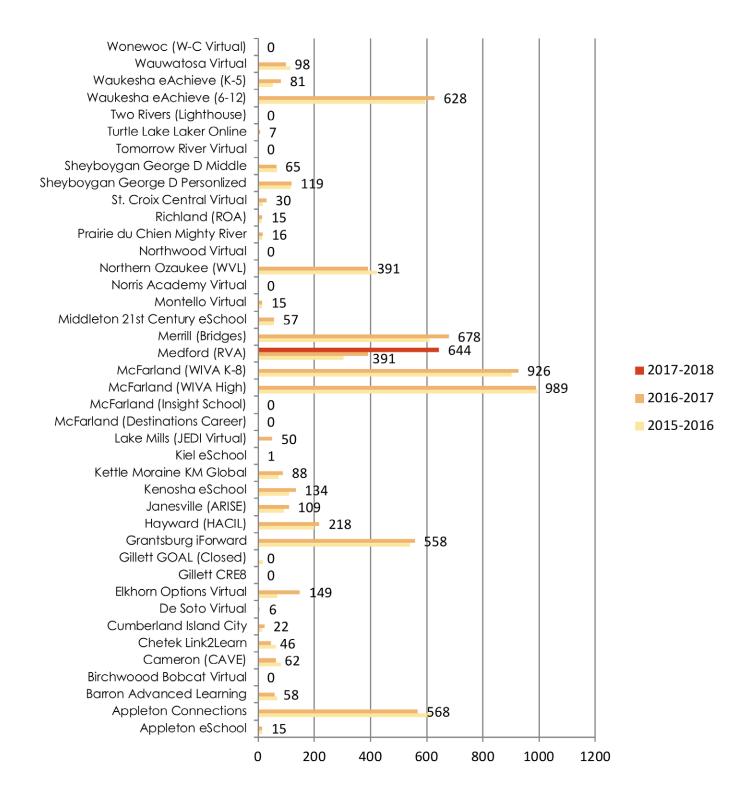

Virtual School Enrollments



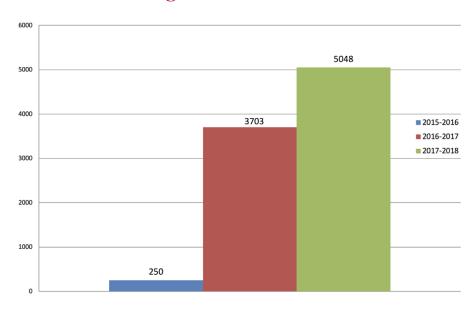
Blended Learning

By virtue of partnering with the RVA, consortium partners can have access to the RVA's digital content. This content is procured and vetted by the Wisconsin eSchool Network under the support and oversight of the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction. The RVA consortium is a member of the Wisconsin eSchool Network and through this connection has access to nearly 1,000 digital courses. The RVA passes access to this content to all consortium districts for use in their traditional classroom environment. This use of digital content in the classroom which allows for students to have some

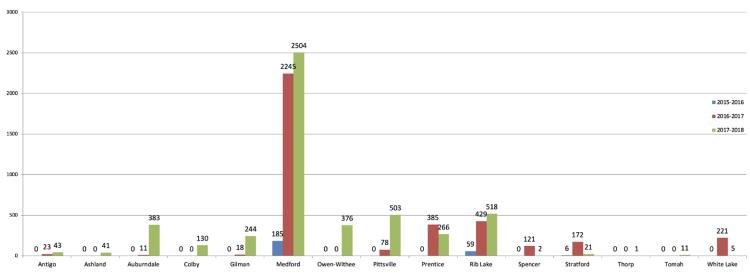
control over their pathways in learning in conjunction with the teachers leading the instruction, we call "blended learning." The instruction in the classroom is a blend of traditional and fully virtual.

The RVA's blended learning initiative began in the 2015-2016 school year. Over the past two years the growth has exceeded expectations. Beginning in the 2018-2019 school year, the RVA will employee 2.0 FTE's of staff specifically designated to support this initiative.

Blended Learning: Total Student Course Enrollments

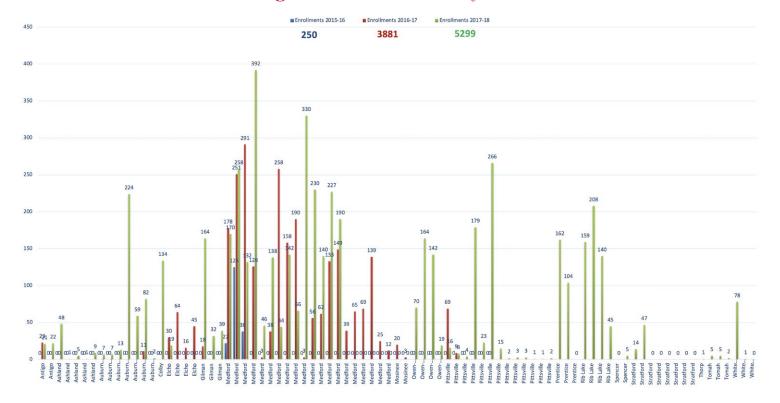


Blended Learning: Total Student Course Enrollments by District

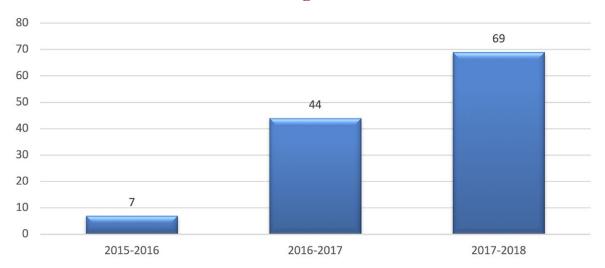




Blended Learning: Total Enrollments by Teacher & District

Financials

BUDGET & EXPENDITURES

The RVA operated its school on budget based upon having a total of 427 expected full-time enrollments. A full-time enrollment is calculated in the following manner for budgeting purposes:

Total number of days open enrolled and affiliated enrollments attended the school. This number is then divided by 180 to determine a total number of full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollments. In 2017–2018, the total number of days attended was 74,056 bringing the total number of full-time equivalent enrollments to 411.42.

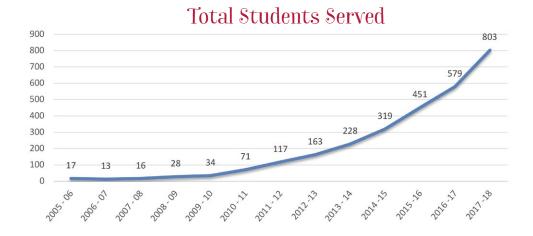
Total number of students from invested member districts prorated to the nearest quarter. As an example, a student from an invested member district who attended the RVA from the beginning of the school year through 1 semester, (2 quarters), would be counted as a 0.5 FTE. A student who attend all year

would be counted as 1.0 FTE. Pre-school student enrollments are based on a full-time equivalency of 0.6 as determined by statute. In the 2017-2018 school year the RVA had 235.40 FTE enrollments from its invested consortium districts.

In 2017-2018, the total number of FTE students attending the RVA was 646.82. This was approximately 219.82 FTE above the budgeted amount. **This equates to a 51% increase in projected enrollments.**

In comparison, the total budget prepared and approved of \$3,142,442 was exceeded. A total of \$3,741,776 was expended in the 2017-2018 school year. This was an increase in spending of 19% above projected.

The following charts and tables illustrate the projections and financial actuals for the RVA 2017-2018 school year, as well as cast forward projections based on past budgetary performance.

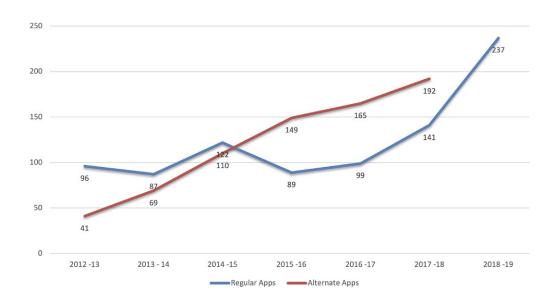

OPEN ENROLLMENT

Through Wisconsin's open enrollment laws, parents can select to send their child to any public school district they choose at any time of the year. Additionally, parents can annually select up to three different school districts to send their child to besides their resident district. Open enrollment has two pathways. The first is called the "regular" application process. The regular application process allows for parents during the months of February through April to file for open enrollment for the next school year. The second pathway is called the "alternate" application process. The alternate process allows for a family to open enroll out of their

resident district at any time during the current school year for particular reasons.

During the 2017-2018 school year, the RVA experienced growth in both the number of families choosing to apply to attend the school for the following school year through the regular application process. Also, the RVA continued to see growth in the number of students seeking to attend the school through the alternate application process. The graph below illustrates the growth of open enrollment to the RVA in each of these areas.



PROJECTIONS & ACTUALS COST PER PUPIL.

The RVA's invested partners have experienced unprecedented economical per pupil costs over the previous two fiscal years. The 2017-2018 fiscal year brought the year-end per pupil cost to invested members districts to \$3,050. The historical 13 year combined average per pupil cost for full-time virtual

school services to invested member districts is \$3,227. Casting forward, the per pupil amount per invested member district is expected to increase due to needing additional staff and other value-added additions to the school with 2018-2019 year-end projections estimated to be approximately \$3,829.



2018 -19 RVA Budget

The 2018-2019 budget reflects a 56% increase over the past year in anticipation of growth to support a total of an approximate 790 full-time equivalent students.

Increases in operational expenditures are forecasted in almost all categorical areas with the largest increases being in both "Salaries & Benefits" and "Purchased Services & Other." Curriculum increases are commensurate with the additional projected enrollments in each grade level based upon historical usage. Capital expenditures include the necessary increases in devices with more students and staff. A reduction in "Field Trips & Activities" in this budget was actualized due to a line item of "Computer Supplies" being moved from this category to another. Potential offsets to the budget would occur if the RVA is successful in attaining competitive funds from the Charter School Expansion Grant in the amount of \$750,000 to be spent over a course of 5 years.

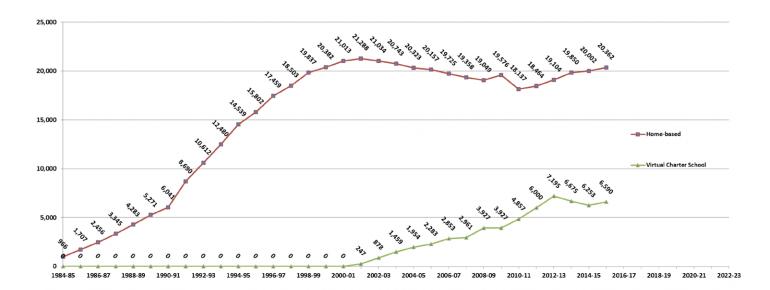

VIRTUAL SCHOOL & HOMEBASED ENROLLMENT

Another key indicator of predicted growth can be found in comparing the number of Wisconsin private homebased education students against those enrollments in public virtual charter schools. A significant portion of students enrolling in the RVA

come from previously attending a private homebased school program. Analysis of this data shows both Wisconsin's private homebased as well as public virtual school enrollments continue to increase.

I like that it is a 4day work week and it motivates me and the kids to have a shorter week and more time for other things. Breaking it up into 36 weeks allows me to have a clear vision for the year rather than be overwhelmed by hundreds of lessons. We started out with Calvert and that was difficult for myself and for my son. We switched to odysseyware and we could not be more happier with this switch. School for my son can be difficult and the Odysseyware really had made a huge difference for learning for my son.

We're using book shark and mostly like it, with some tweaks. I looked into some of the other options RVA offers and from what I found, I don't think the others would be a good fit. I'd love to see more options that stay away from worksheets and busy work but offer more hands on approaches or video content for things like history and language arts. We do like the chapter books Book Shark has for teaching history. The text book type layout for history and science isn't near as engaging. Another option I would love to see would be a curriculum that did unit blocks where you learn about one topic at a time and all subjects can be done based off that topic. And if those topics related to every day life skills that would be even better. For example, a cooking/ baking lesson block can cover science, math, history (with stories about cooking during certain time periods), and language arts (writing out a recipe/directions). If there was a curriculum that focused more toward every day life skills while teaching grade appropriate requirements, that would be our number one choice.

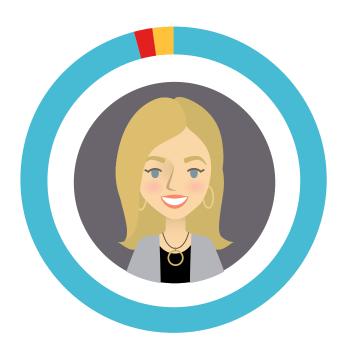
Both our teachers this year, ******* and *******, go above and beyond in knowing our family and working with us to customize our learning.

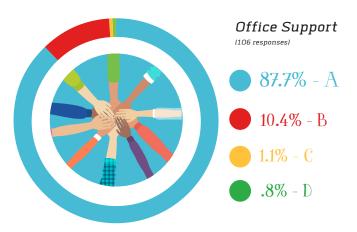

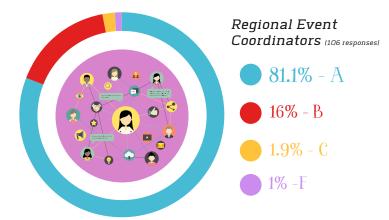

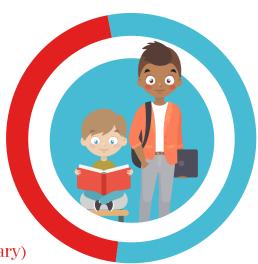
